We hope that such a move creates a dynamo effect of meaningful conversations, like extending maternity benefits under PMMVY to the second live birth.

Blog: Budget 2022

In a poverty-stricken nation like India, the annual Union Budget is viewed not only as a financial document but as a guiding light for citizens, giving them hope and feeding their aspirations for the coming year. In our team's assessment of the Union Budget 2022, they touch upon some important points, such as:

- Women constitute a large number of the beneficiaries and often depend on the MGNREGA scheme for employment, but its allocation has been reduced by 20%.
- Funds not allocated sufficiently to implement the PMMVY scheme and other maternal & child health measures.
- There was a need for doubling the education budget to ensure the provisions of the NEP be carried out effectively, especially in a pandemic-ridden scenario. This was not done.
- The budget allocations to reopen schools safely are being used for the maintenance of the physical infrastructure.
- There is no specification of social security benefits to 400 million unorganized workers in the budget.
- No urban job guarantee scheme has been announced even though urban employment is higher than the national average.

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












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
